The Slow Reading Ethnography Experiment

In December and January, the Haddon Library and the Social Anthropology Department are offering the Slow Reading Ethnography Experiment. The experiment, for Part II undergraduate students, is a series of optional workshops to support radically different – 'slow' – approaches to ethnographic reading, in contrast to 'fast' and extractive reading for essays and exams. The experiment will be launched in late Michaelmas with an after-hours event at the Haddon Library where students will be supported in finding an ethnographic monograph that sparks their curiosity. Students will then read the book over the winter break, experimenting with slow reading as they best see fit. In early Lent, the students will meet again to discuss what they have found out: about people, themselves, anthropology and reading. In addition to the workshops, there is an optional opportunity for students to contribute to an article about the political, ethical and personal dynamics of ethnographic reading. Thus far, 15 students have registered, and a parallel group of PhD students is forming. The Haddon Library is excited to take part and happy to answer any questions.

Film, Sound, Music and Broadcast Databases to Explore

Did you know that the University subscribes to several services that stream film, sound, music and broadcasts? Stream something new today for free (off-campus universit members will need to authenticate first with Raven)!

- Artfilms: Artfilms contains films by and about a large number of independent artists and filmmakers.
- <u>Bloomsbury Popular Music</u>: Bloomsbury Popular Music provides unrivalled scholarly coverage of modern popular music worldwide, covering the mid-20th century to the present day.
- Box of Broadcasts (BoB): Box of Broadcasts is an amazing archive of over 2 million TV and radio broadcasts, many of which first appeared on the BBC, ITV, Channel 4, Film4, Channel 5, CNN and Sky News, as well as having access to an extensive archive.
- <u>Digitalia Film Archive</u>: A streaming library of world cinema, with a particular focus on Latin American films.
- <u>Ethnographic Sound Archives Online</u>: Ethnographic Sound Archives Online brings together 2,000 hours of audio recordings from field expeditions around the world, particularly from the 1960s through the 1980s—the dawn of ethnomusicology as a codified discipline.
- <u>Ethnographic Video Online</u>: Ethnographic Video Online is the most comprehensive resource for visual anthropology in the world, providing access to more than 2,000 hours of film and always growing, from raw field footage to crafted ethnographies and documentaries.
- <u>Klassiki Online</u>: A streaming service for films from Russia, the Caucasus and Central Asia go to https://klassiki.online/register/university-of-cambridge/ to set up an account.
- Medici TV: A streaming music video database with the best of classical music including concerts, operas, ballets, archival documents, portraits of artists and composers, master classes, conductors in rehearsals.
- <u>National Sound Archive</u>: The British Library Sound Archive is among the largest collections of recorded sound in the world, including music, spoken word and ambient recordings, including commercial record releases, radio broadcasts, and privately made recordings.
